- JW: In addition, I would like to eventually see detail incorporated about what Teams look at in regard to goals of the Program, actions to meet those goals, and how it is financed (as part of the overall Strategy Review System [SRS])
 - Are we spending \$ on the most important actions that will move the bar toward our goal(s)?
 - Not all current and previously funded projects seem to work on "moving the bar"
- DN: I would be pleased if, on the internal side, there was a layer of finance and funding that ingrained itself into the SRS process
- The workgroup's external influence could be evaluating whether or not the products we are sending out of the Program are working efficiently
- DN: Where we have the most interpretation and need for clarification is in 2b.
- JW: For **1.a.i-iii**, we need to start developing a process now, in order to know what will the work will look like down the road
 - Jana Davis (JD): Workgroup should start talking about process in January 2017, with a process down by March 1, 2017
 - Screening for redundancies is part of CBT's responsibility and should be built into the process
 - CBT is open to being responsible for that task, with Workgroup guidance
- JW: (example) through the new strategy review system (SRS), topics being discussed are not separated by GIT
 - All people who might have similar issues will have the chance to talk about projects in a new context that can be built into the tasks of the SRS
 - This is one way we can screen for redundancies and identify gaps
 - KS: You can also build questions in to meeting templates that relate specifically to redundancy, finance, and funding
 - But in beginning stages, also keep it a separate topic of conversation
- 3.a \rightarrow Are we still looking to identify opportunities, or is this specific to CBARA?
- A standard template (CBARA) could tie funding to particular outcomes in the Bay agreement
 - o Is this useful for jurisdictions and the overall Program?
 - If Staying with a "lump sum" is easier, is there value in breaking a template down into \$ toward specific outcomes?
- A plan has to precede 3a. should be initiated Feb. 1, 2017
 - o Submit a proposal to OMB May 1, 2017
 - Has to go through B&FWG, GIT6, & MB before submittal to OMB

- NK: If we are going to change the CBARA reporting exercise, it will need to be
 for the year AFTER we agree that that's the way to do it, to give jurisdictions
 time to gather information in the new format
 - So the first year under the new process would be 2018 submissions
- KS: The language that we use doesn't always speak to people outside of our circle easily. People in the private sector are unsure of how to interface with the Program and understand our work
- EC: State partners are a potential beneficiary of the work that this group does; maybe even State legislatures
 - If you can give guidance on what type of environment needs to be created for innovative environmental financing to be successful, you give legislative guidance on how to create that environment
- DN: This group can help move and guide the conversation by focusing on processes that are in place currently
 - If you went through the GITs or the GIT Funding projects, and had conversations around how that project is most efficiently funded/financed, this allows others to come forward with similar issues and how they are dealing with them
- The workgroup has the chance to identify issues and opportunities in financing;
 not necessarily creating finance strategies
 - o Finance models would look very different between GITs
 - A high-level finance strategy wouldn't be applicable
- KS: Begin conversations in other GITs meetings on how to explore the nexus between the work they're doing and the financing world
 - JW: Can also bring GIT Chairs into some of our workgroup meetings to have these discussions
- A starting point is to ask groups what they have been doing/looking at related to financing in the work they're doing
 - o And what kind of information/resources would be most useful to them
- JW: What if we came up with 3-5 paragraphs, from the Chair of this workgroup (Dan) to Chairs of the GITs/other workgroups?
 - "Here's what we would like to discuss with you... We would like to be in one of your meetings to do x, y, and z..."
 - Will figure out internally (within the B&FWG) who should go to these meetings
- JE: Consider putting together a "Financing 101" for Goal Teams as an intro to our larger discussion with them
 - o DN: Something like this exists for stormwater financing, we could use it as
