<u>Riparian Forest Buffer and Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)</u> <u>Discussion</u>

The Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) is an offshoot of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), the country's largest private-land conservation program. Administered

by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), CREP targets high-priority conservation issues identified by local, state, or tribal governments or non-governmental organizations. In exchange for removing environmentally sensitive land from production and introducing conservation practices, farmers, ranchers, and agricultural land owners are paid an annual rental rate. Participation is voluntary, and the contract period is typically 10–15 years, along with other federal and state incentives as applicable per each CREP agreement. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) conducts the site visits and provides technical service for the conservation plan.
