Introduction

The role of outreach coordinator was created and filled in September of 2016 as the Bay Program recognized a need to take a full ecosystem view of the watershed and to reach out within the partnership and to a larger network of partners beyond.

Outreach definition and complement to the needs of other sectors

Outreach Coordinator works to establish and strengthen relationships for the Bay Program in an expanding, comprehensive, and well-rounded network of organizations and individuals.

Outreach helps to diversify the network with which teams engage in order to be more effective, diversifying GIT messages to other groups and creating a unified effort of conservation and restoration across the watershed.

While Communications is about delivering a message, outreach always has a two-way dynamic focused on the creation of relationships. In any action or interaction, relationships will either be created, strengthened, soured, repaired, or weakened. Outreach provides a lens of continuation and partnership to all efforts.
