Criteria for EC and PSC to determine whether to change a Goal or Outcome in the Bay Agreement

The Bay Agreement states:

"As the signatories identify new opportunities and concerns, Goals or Outcomes may be adopted or modified. Any changes or additions to Goals will be approved by the Executive Council. The Principals' Staff Committee will approve changes or additions to Outcomes, although significant changes or additions will be raised to the Executive Council for approval. Proposed changes to Goals and Outcomes or the addition of new ones will be open for public input before being finalized."

Goals or Outcomes may be adopted or modified if the signatories identify new opportunities and concerns.

a. Changes to GOALS

- i. The Executive Council will approve any changes or additions to Goals.
- ii. Changes to Goals should not be made for political or economic reasons and the rationale for the change should have a substantial basis in facts and science.

b. Changes to OUTCOMES

- i. The Principals' Staff Committee will approve "non-significant" changes or additions to Outcomes.
- ii. Changes to Outcome should not be made for political or economic reasons and the rationale for the change should have a substantial basis in facts and science.
- iii. The following list is illustrative of circumstances that would warrant an Outcome change by the PSC. The list is not meant to restrict the PSC to these scenarios because every circumstance that could possibly arise cannot be anticipated at this time.
 - mistake in fact
 - new scientific discoveries or evidence warrants a slightly-revised target or outcome number.
 - New science or management approaches that warrant a language change to more accurately reflect actions necessary
- c. "Significant" changes or additions to Outcomes will be raised to the Executive Council for approval.
 - i. Significant changes include:
 - 1. Any change that decreases numeric targets
 - 2. Changes that call for a 10% or more increase in numeric targets.
 - 3. Any new outcomes that are not currently in the Agreement
